Greywater Systems

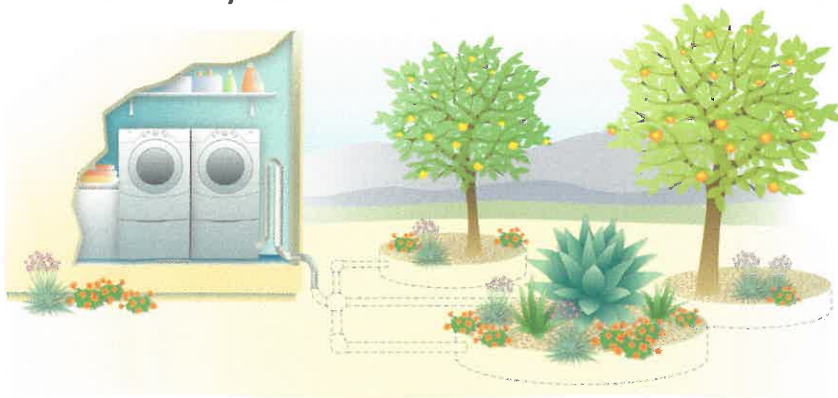

Greywater Action will present greywater design and installation features for the most common household-to-landscape systems, as well as information on county permitting requirements. In 2010, the State of California revised the building codes so that greywater use is now legal throughout the state.

After a PowerPoint presentation, participants are invited to share questions about their specific projects to provide real life examples of the principles and practices behind these sustainable systems.



Speaker: Christina Berteau, Greywater Action



Christina Berteau served a four-year apprenticeship in Local 159, Plumbers and Steamfitters, and was the first woman admitted in the program, becoming a contractor in 1996. She has taught plumbing classes that also work on Habitat for Humanity houses in East Oakland.

Greywater Action is a collaboration of educators who teach residents and tradespeople about affordable and simple household water systems that dramatically reduce water use and foster sustainable cultures of water.
